AACN Position Statement:Academic Progression in Nursing: Moving Together Toward a Highly Educated Nursing Workforce

About the Position Statement

x In July 2016, the AACN Board of Directors created Academic Progression Task Force to consider models for academic progression in light of workforce needs with an emphasis on maintaining high quality standards in academic programs. The task force was charged with creating a position statement that articulates AACN's commitment to creating a more highly educated nursing workforce and answering the Institute of Medicine's call for increasing the number of baccalaureatepared registered nurses

- x The statement outlines AACN's position that academic progression from associate degree and diploma programs should end in a progleanding to a baccalaureate degree (or entry level master's degree) offered by an accredited frear-college or university.
- x A footnote clarifying that "four-year college or university" includehose programs at member schools thatthe baccalaureate fall into more than a dozen categorieshich could be confusing for legislators, students, the public other stakeholders
- x The new position statement provides added supportember schools istates moving to offer communitycollege based baccalaate programs which could impact limited resources (funding, faculty, clinical placements; ietc.). Without this statement, schools do not have official language from AACN to supprove position that academic progression initiatives that culminate in baccalaureate degrees be offered the four-year colleges and universities.
- x This new statement does not replace AACN's letanding position titled The Baccalaureate Degree in Nursing as Minimal Preparation for Professional Practice (2000) We strongly believe that registered nurses should enter the profession with a baccalaureate degree and encourage all nurses to advance their education to better serve
